BOARD MEETING

March 26, 2012

MINUTES

The New Mexico Junior College Board met on Monday, March 26, 2012, beginning at 4:00 p.m. in the Zia Room of Pannell Library. The following members were present: Mr. Guy Kesner, Chairman; Ms. Patricia Chappelle, Secretary; Mr. Ron Black; Mr. Zeak Williams; and Mr. Hector Baeza. Not present was Mrs. Mary Lou Vinson.

Mr. Kesner called the meeting to order and welcomed visitors and guests present.

Upon a motion by Mr. Baeza, seconded by Ms. Chappelle, the agenda was unanimously adopted, as presented.

Upon a motion by Mr. Black, seconded by Mr. Williams, the Board unanimously approved the minutes of February 23, 2012.

Under President's Report, Sylvia Quintana, with Chesapeake Energy Corporation, presented a \$50,000 commitment for scholarships over the next five years (\$10,000 per year).

Under New Business, Dan Hardin introduced Cindy Bryan with Accounting & Consulting Group, who presented the Audit Report. Upon a motion by Mr. Black, seconded by Ms. Chappelle, the board unanimously approved the audit, as presented.

Mr. Hardin presented the February financial reports and with a motion by Mr. Baeza, seconded by Mr. Williams, the Board unanimously approved the expenditures for February, 2012.

Kelly Holladay presented a fee increase request for the First Aid and CPR class to cover the cost of the certification. The fee will increase from \$10 to \$40. Upon a motion by Mr. Black, seconded by Ms. Chappelle, the Board unanimously approved the request.

Ms. Chappelle moved the board go into closed session for the discussion of limited personnel matters and real property under the provisions of section 10-15-1-H (2) & H (8) of New Mexico Statutes Annotated 1978. Mr. Baeza seconded the motion. The roll call vote was as follows: Mr. Black - yes; Mr. Kesner - yes; Mr. Baeza - yes; Ms. Chappelle - yes; and Mr. Williams - yes.

Upon re-convening in open meeting, Mr. Kesner stated that the matters discussed in the closed meeting were limited only to those specified in the motion for closure.

Dr. McCleery discussed the potential sale of New Mexico Junior College real property. College attorney, Scotty Holloman discussed the various aspects of a potential sale of the Del Norte property. Upon a motion by Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Baeza, the Board unanimously approved the administration moving forward compiling a bid package for a public bid for the Del Norte property. The bid package should include a new appraisal certified by the State Tax and Revenue Department, survey, title policy, and a proposed contract subject to approval by the appropriate state agencies.

Dr. McCleery discussed the proposed senior warm water facility to be built on the campus of New Mexico Junior College. After discussion regarding the purpose and concept, a motion was made by Mr. Black and a second by Mr. Baeza for the administration to move forward with the design, engineering, and securing a CES contractor. The final construction contract will be brought back to the Board for consideration and then to the appropriate State agencies for approval.

Mr. Kesner called for comments from the public. There being none, the next regular board meeting was scheduled for Thursday, April 19, 2012, beginning at 4:00 p.m. The budget work session will be held April 12, 2012 beginning at noon.

Upon a motion by Mr. Black, seconded by Mr. Williams, the board meeting adjourned at 5:45 p.m.

POLICY TOPIC: Absence from Assigned Responsibilities due to Participating in Local, State or

National Activities of a Political Nature

All New Mexico Junior College employees shall have the privilege of participation in political as well as other community activities. Each employee shall indicate that comments, actions and/or statements are his/her own and in no way represent any other person officially associated with the College.

Prior to an announcement for a public office or position that is determined by vote, the employee shall consult with the President at which time a conference shall be arranged with the employee and his/her supervisor. After visiting with the employee and the supervisor, the President shall inform members of the Board of the expected announcement.

When election to a position shall result in the employee being absent from assigned duties for a period of time in excess of accrued vacation and accrued personal leave, the employee shall serve "without pay and without prejudice" from the College.

New Mexico Junior College encourages each and every employee to participate in our election process to include local, state and national elections. NMJC also encourages each employee to vote his/her conviction on each/every issue. However, the College cautions the employees to refrain from actively working in any political campaign during those hours for which they are being compensated by the New Mexico Junior College District.
