#### OCTOBER 18, 2012

#### MINUTES

The New Mexico Junior College Board met on Thursday, October 18, 2012, beginning at 4:00 p.m. in the Zia Room of Pannell Library. The following members were present: Mr. Guy Kesner, Chairman; Ms. Patricia Chappelle, Secretary; Mr. Hector Baeza; Mr. Travis Glenn; Mr. Ron Black; and Mrs. Mary Lou Vinson. Not present was Mr. Zeak Williams.

Mr. Kesner called the meeting to order and welcomed visitors and guests present.

Upon a motion by Mr. Glenn, seconded by Mrs. Vinson, the agenda was unanimously adopted.

Upon a motion by Mr. Black, seconded by Mr. Baeza, the Board unanimously approved the minutes of September 13, 2012.

*Under President's Report,* Bill Morrill gave the Board an update on Del Norte Fitness Center and Jeff McCool reported on the recent programs at Training and Outreach.

*Under New Business*, Dan Hardin presented the September financial reports and with a motion by Mr. Glenn, seconded by Ms. Chappelle, the Board unanimously approved the expenditures for September, 2012.

Dr. McCleery presented a proposal from Urenco for Board consideration. Urenco currently pays a PILT (payment in lieu of taxes) to Lea County. That PILT is prorated to other entities including New Mexico Junior College. This has been in place for several years. Urenco submits to the County information about the assessment of the construction and property owned by Urenco. The assessment information was submitted incorrectly and Urenco has overpaid by approximately \$1.2 million in PILT payments. Urenco is partitioning the County to reduce the PILT because of the over assessment. If the County agrees to reduce the PILT, New Mexico Junior College will take a reduction in the PILT of \$254,561.54. The Urenco proposal is to reduce the PILT over a five year period. The affect to New

Mexico Junior College will be a reduction in PILT of \$50,912.31 per year. In Fiscal Year 2012, New Mexico Junior College received \$405,516.68 in PILT payments. The Fiscal Year 2013 proposed PILT will be at least \$354,604.37. Urenco is asking for the Board's approval of the proposed reduction of the PILT and for the reduction to be spread over a five year period. Upon a motion by Mr. Black, seconded by Mrs. Vinson, the Board unanimously approved the proposal.

Delores Thompson recommended Ms. Stacy Reed for the Professor of Nursing position at a nine month salary of \$45,882. Upon a motion by Mrs. Vinson, seconded by Mr. Baeza, the Board unanimously approved the employment of Ms. Reed.

Bill Morrill presented an Addendum to Employment Agreement. The purpose of the addendum is to correct an error in Dr. Steve McCleery's employment contract executed by Dr. McCleery and New Mexico Junior College Board Chairman Guy Kesner effective July 1, 2012. Number ten (10.) in the agreement states: "College shall provide McCleery an allowance each year during the term of this Agreement in the amount of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) per <u>month</u> payable at the same time as salary is paid to pay for housing and automobile expense". Number ten (10.) of the agreement should read and with this addendum will read: "College shall provide McCleery an allowance each year during the term of this Agreement in the amount of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) per <u>year</u> payable at the same time as salary is paid to pay for housing and automobile expense". Upon a motion by Mr. Black, seconded by Mr. Glenn, the Board unanimously approved the Addendum.

Mr. Kesner called for comments from the public. There being none, the next regular board meeting was scheduled for Thursday, November 15, 2012, beginning at 4:00 p.m.

Upon a motion by Mr. Black, seconded by Mrs. Vinson, the board meeting adjourned at 4:35 p.m.

RE:	Fee Increase Request for Driver Education

New Mexico Junior College has been approved by the State of New Mexico Motor Vehicle Division to be a test site for the Driver Knowledge Test, which is taken to obtain a learner's permit. Our plan is to work with the state vendor for this testing system, Solutions Thru Software, and equip the NMJC Testing Center to allow students and citizens the opportunity to take this test here on the campus of New Mexico Junior College.

In order to accommodate this change, we are asking for your approval to raise fees \$10.00 to cover the associated costs and administrative fees. This will bring the total amount charged to Driver Education students from \$150.00 to \$160.00.

We believe this is a great opportunity for NMJC to be a part of offering additional services to our community and will also reduce the amount of time individuals may have to spend standing in line at the Motor Vehicle Division.

Re: Transcript Ordering from Student Clearinghouse

#### Background

Dr. Organ and I attended a demonstration of the services offered by the National Student Clearinghouse in spring 2012. Based on the information gained at the presentation and additional research, I propose that NMJC begin using the National Student Clearinghouse for transcript ordering. We currently use the Clearinghouse's Core Services to report enrollment verification and deferment reporting on our financial aid students to lending organizations and NSLDS. I currently submit monthly reports.

Transcript ordering through Clearinghouse offers these benefits:

- Online application that enables students and alumni to order transcripts via the web (Currently, our alumni cannot log into the T-BirdWeb Portal to order online, so this would help our former students.)
- State-of-the-art document security
- Improved student service, including paperless consent and mobile text alerts
- Reports on usage can be generated. Reports provide real-time information on how our students and alumni are using Transcript Services.
- Customized and branded webpage (There is a link on our webpage that takes the student to the Clearinghouse order form.)
- NMJC would still print and mail-out transcript requests that come through Clearinghouse.

During the 2011-2012 fiscal year, we printed 4,584 transcripts. Current students can print an unofficial copy of their transcript from the T-BirdWeb Portal.

#### Considerations

Clearinghouse charges \$2.25 to the requestor per delivered transcript to cover their expenses. If we charge a fee, they collect the fee and submit a check to us each month. We are currently charging \$2.00 per transcript request. In an earlier meeting with Mr. Hardin, Dr. Organ, Kerrie Mitchell, and George Garcia we discussed charging at total of \$5.00 per transcript (\$2.25 Clearinghouse fee and we would receive \$2.75).

I spoke to Odessa College and Midland College personnel who said that the transcript fees are a part of their general use fees, and when they charged it was a problem determining who had paid and who had not. It sounds like they were having some of the same problems we are with online ordering and paying.

#### Recommendation

It is my recommendation with input from Vice Presidents Organ and Hardin that we use the National Student Clearinghouse for transcript ordering and that we charge students \$5.00 per transcript.
