

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR

Louisa May Alcott based the March sisters on her own family, making Little Women a semi-autobiographical story, and the first in a trilogy. While the second two novels are less famous, and certainly less adapted, this primary story has seen success across the mediums of film, television, and stage in the form of musicals and plays. There is an enduring beauty in the story of four sisters growing up in the shadow of the Civil War that has stuck with audiences since its debut in two parts, beginning in 1868 and concluding in 1869. I have loved this novel, and the film adaptations that have accompanied it, and wanted to stage this play for years. What Kate Hamill has done is nothing short of remarkable in her adaptation. While she centers the action on Jo and invites us to see the family through her eyes, she has really crafted a modern vision of these 19th Century characters and displayed why they have endured as long as they have. Whether you're discovering the March sisters for the first time or returning to them as you would an old friend, we invite you to accompany them on their journey through childhood and into the perils of adulthood. For as the text says, "Nothing lasts forever."

Last year more than 1,500 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.
